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

Wednesday Advent 3



⊕ Preparation for Worship: Read Psalm 2 (Lutheran Service Book or Pew Bible) ⊕

Greeting and prayer: (Pastor)

During our Wednesday Advent worship services we are examining some of the titles given to Jesus in Isaiah 9:6—Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, and Prince of Peace—and will study how each of these titles describes something about *who* Jesus is and *what* He did for our salvation.

Tonight we consider why Jesus is called "Father" even though He is the eternal Son of the Father. Jesus, our "Everlasting Father" rules over creation and His people like a loving father and His kingdom is eternal. The One who rules over all things loves <u>us!</u> What comfort this gives us, especially as we face trials and suffering in this world.

We pray that the Holy Spirit would bless our worship and study of His Word, and so, we begin our worship service with prayer...

Advent Invocation

We invoke ("call upon") the name of the one true God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Confession and Absolution

We come before our Holy God recognizing that we are sinful and daily need His forgiveness.

- P Jesus is the Light of the World, and in Him is no darkness at all.
- If we walk in the light as He is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus Christ, God's Son, cleanses us from all sin.
- **P** In this Advent season we celebrate the *coming* of Jesus, the Light of the World.
- Dear Jesus, we celebrate Your coming at Your birth in Bethlehem.

 We thank You for coming into our hearts by Your gift of faith,
 and we look forward to Your coming on the Last Day when You will take us,
 and all believers, to be with You forever in heaven.


- As we meditate on Your manger, Your cross, Your empty tomb, and Your Word, we come before Your throne today confessing our sins and asking for Your forgiveness.
- Lord of heaven and earth, forgive us all our sins.

 As we see the world in darkness and in need of Your light, increase our faith, love, courage, and strength.

 Give us Your power to be lights in this world, reflecting Your love. Amen.
- Our Father in Heaven has been good and merciful to us.
 In His love He has given us, His children, the greatest Gift: He sent His Son Jesus, the Christ Child, whose birth in Bethlehem so long ago we celebrate.

 Jesus came as a lowly servant to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world. By His shed blood on the cross we are forgiven! In peace and joy let us sing of our salvation!

First Reading

Colossians 1:15-20 (ESV)

¹⁵[Jesus] is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. ¹⁶For by Him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through Him and for Him. ¹⁷And He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together. ¹⁸And He is the head of the body, the church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in everything He might be preeminent. ¹⁹For in Him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ²⁰and through Him to reconcile to Himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of His cross.

Gospel Reading

John 14:1-11 (NKJV)

- **P** The Gospel reading is from John 14:1-11.
- **G** Sanctify us by Your truth, O LORD. Your Word is truth!

"Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me. ² In My Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. ³ And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, there you may be also. ⁴ And where I go you know, and the way you know."


⁵ Thomas said to Him, "Lord, we do not know where You are going, and how can we know the way?"

⁶ Jesus said to him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me. ⁷ "If you had known Me, you would have known My Father also; and from now on you know Him and have seen Him."

⁸ Philip said to Him, "Lord, show us the Father, and it is sufficient for us."

⁹ Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you so long, and yet you have not known Me, Philip? He who has seen Me has seen the Father; so how can you say, 'Show us the Father'? ¹⁰ Do you not believe that I am in the Father, and the Father in Me? The words that I speak to you I do not speak on My own authority; but the Father who dwells in Me does the works. ¹¹ Believe Me that I am in the Father and the Father in Me, or else believe Me for the sake of the works themselves.

The 2nd Article of the Apostle's Creed with explanation from Luther's Catechism (Sydow, p. 87)

I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, Our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried; He descended into hell; the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven and sits on the right hand of God, the Father Almighty; from there He shall come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the virgin Mary is my Lord.

He has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sin, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and His innocent suffering and death.

He did this that I should be His very own, live under Him in His kingdom, and serve Him in eternal righteousness, innocence, and joy; just as He is risen from death, lives and reigns in eternity. This is most certainly true!

Children's Sermon - Children 10 years old and younger are invited to come up front.


Sermon Text: Isaiah 9:6-7 (ESV)

Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven; give us this day our daily bread;


and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

The Advent Wreath



The Advent wreath is rich in symbolism, and as such it aids our worship as it reinforces our hope in the ultimate coming of our Lord. The wreath is covered with evergreen. Just as this species of tree is always green, so our hope for eternity is always alive because it rests upon the living Christ. The wreath is also in the form of a circle, which has no beginning and no end. What better way to picture that our life with God is everlasting.

The lighted candles are symbolic of the light of Christ and His Gospel, which alone can lift us out of our sin & spiritual darkness. The 4 Advent candles remind us of the 4000 years of waiting for Christ by the Old Testament world. The 3 purple candles are the color for repentance (or blue, which is meant to suggest anticipation and hope). The rose (pink) candle is the color for **joy**. Each of the 4 candles has been assigned a special name with special significance: **Hope, Peace, Joy,** and **Love**.

The Christ Candle is the white candle in the center, and is lit on Christmas Eve. It signals that He Who is the Light of the world has been born.

The light these candles put forth seems small; so does the gospel at times. But to those in lonely darkness, it is the powerful light which shows the way to Heaven.
