Palm Sunday Greeting and Prayer: (Pastor)

P Brothers and sisters in Christ, We begin our Holy Week and our Palm Sunday worship in the name of the Triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. On this special day we enter into Jesus' presence with palms and hosannas, as the people did on that first Palm Sunday. We will lay our palm branches around this altar and before Christ's cross, remembering that this was the reason He entered Jerusalem triumphantly on that Palm Sunday—to win that victory for us over sin and death by His own death on that cross.

We pray:

Dear Jesus, All of our worship and medidation during this season of Lent has pointed us to this week, which we call Holy Week. As we celebrate how You entered to the welcome of palms and hosannas, we also remember Your death, which gives us life, and Your resurrection, through which we will dwell with You for all eternity. Bless us in our worship today and fill our hearts with joy and praise as we sing and speak our "Hosannas" to You today, and throughout our lives. In Your name we pray, dear Savior and King.

C Amen.

We gather outside for the procession with palms.

Please pick up a palm branch from our confirmation students in the entryway and gather outside in front of our church building.

Procession with Palms

- The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God the Father and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.
- **C** And also with you.
- P Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
- Hosanna to the Son of David!
- P We pray:
- O God, who through Your prophets foretold our King's coming: we give You thanks for fulfilling Your Word, and we pray that You would use these palms to remind us of the day He entered Jerusalem. Bless us who bear them, and grant that we may rejoice in His salvation in the heavenly Jerusalem; through Your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Responsive Reading: Psalm 118:19-29

- P Open to me the gates of righteousness, I will go through them, and I will praise the LORD.
- This is the gate of the LORD; through which the righteous shall enter.
- P I will praise You, for You have answered me, and have become my salvation.


Confession and Absolution

⁹ Rejoice greatly, Daughter of Zion! Shout, Daughter of Jerusalem! Look! Your King is coming to you. He is righteous and brings salvation. He is humble and is riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. ¹⁰ I will cut off the chariot from Ephraim and the horse from Jerusalem. The battle bow will be taken away, and he will proclaim peace to the nations.

Second Reading


Philippians 2:5-11 (EHV)

- **P** The second reading is from Philippians 2:5-11.
- Sanctify us by Your truth, O LORD. Your Word is truth!

⁵ Indeed, let this attitude be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus. ⁶ Though he was by nature God, he did not consider equality with God as a prize to be displayed, ⁷ but he emptied himself by taking the nature of a servant. When he was born in human likeness, and his appearance was like that of any other man, ⁸ he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. ⁹ Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ so that at the name of Jesus every knee will bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Confession of Faith - Formula of Concord, Epitome: VIII We boldly confess what we believe.

Our doctrine, faith, and confession is as follows:

The divine and human natures in Christ are personally united.

So there are not two Christs, one the Son of God and the other the Son of Man.

But one and the same person is the Son of God and Son of Man....

So we believe, teach, and confess that Mary conceived and bore not merely a man and no more, but God's true Son....

We also believe, teach, and confess that it was not a mere man who suffered, died, and was buried, descended into hell, rose from the dead, ascended into heaven, and was raised to God's majesty and almighty power for us.

But it was a man whose human nature has such a profound, indescribable union and communion with God's Son that it is one person with Him....

We believe, teach, and confess that the Son of Man really is exalted.

Sermon Text: Luke 19:28-40 (NKJV)


When He had said this, He went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. ²⁹ And it came to pass, when He came near to Bethphage and Bethany, at the mountain called Olivet, that He sent two of His disciples, ³⁰ saying, "Go into the village opposite you, where as you enter you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat. Loose it and bring it here. ³¹ "And if anyone asks you, 'Why are you loosing it?' thus you shall say to him, 'Because the Lord has need of it.' " ³² So those who were sent went their way and found it just as He had said to them. ³³ But as they were loosing the colt, the owners of it said to them, "Why are you loosing the colt?" ³⁴ And they said, "The Lord has need of him." ³⁵ Then they brought him to Jesus. And they threw their own clothes on the colt, and they set Jesus on him. ³⁶ And as He went, many spread their clothes on the road. ³⁷ Then, as He


was now drawing near the descent of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works they had seen, ³⁸ saying: "'Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the LORD!' Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" ³⁹ And some of the Pharisees called to Him from the crowd, "Teacher, rebuke Your disciples." ⁴⁰ But He answered and said to them, "I tell you that if these should keep silent, the stones would immediately cry out."

Sermon Theme: The King on a Colt

- How does Zechariah's prophecy from our Old Testament reading help explain what exactly was going on with this unusual scene on Palm Sunday with Jesus riding triumphantly into Jerusalem on a young donkey ("a colt"). (see Zechariah 9:9)
- ♦ Why was it significant that Jesus accepted the people's praises? (v. 37-40)
- Palm Sunday showed Jesus' humility, and the true reason for which He had come to Jerusalem: Not to rule, but to _____. When Jesus comes again it will not be in humility, but in ______! (see our second Scripture reading from Philippians 2:5-11)

Now when they drew near Jerusalem the week that our Christ would die, And next to the Mount of Olives stood, said Jesus, "Hear My de-sire: Go into the village opposite and find there a donkey tied. A colt will be with her. Cut them loose, and bring them here to My side.

If anyone stops or questions you, then this is what you must say, 'The Lord needs them!' and immediately, they will be sent on your way." And all this was done that it might be fulfilled which the prophets said. Isaiah and Zechariah spoke to faithful ones in their days:

"Go, tell Zion's daughter glorious news, 'Behold, your King comes to you! He lowly upon a donkey sits- the colt of it!" Words made true! So Jesus disciples went and did just what He had asked they do, And donkey and colt, with garments laid, came cantering into view.

A multitude gathered near the road, rejoicing and crying out. While some spread their clothes upon the road, an homage along His route, Some others cut branches from the trees and scattered them all about. Each honored the Lord what way he could, and all joined the joyful shout:

"Hosanna!" (which translates, "Save us, Lord!") "Hosanna to David's Son!" And "Blessed is He who in God's name-the name of the Lord-is come!" "The Kingdom of David blessed is! In this same great Name it comes!" "The highest Hosanna!" loud they cried the prophecy of the One.

The city was moved. They asked, "Who's this?" The crowd answered happily. "It's Jesus of Nazareth," they said, "the prophet from Galilee!" The Pharisees called, "Rebuke Your friends!" but what they had failed to see Was, "Had these kept still, the stones would speak." and so Jesus let them be.

Let us pray for the whole people of God in Christ Jesus and for all people according to their needs.

That the humility of our Lord's suffering and death bring forth in us the fruits of faith and renewed faithfulness for us and for all who hear His Word today, let us pray to the Lord.

C Lord, have mercy.

That the sufferings of Christ in our place not only strengthen us in faith but give us courage to proclaim His salvation to the ends of the earth, let us pray to the Lord.

C Lord, have mercy.

That the wounds of the sick, the suffering, the grieving, and the dying find healing in the wounds of Christ our Lord, let us pray to the Lord.

C Lord, have mercy.

That Jesus' gracious humility in giving us His righteousness as our baptismal clothing and His flesh and blood as our spiritual food equip us with all that we need to do the good works of faith, let us pray to the Lord.

C Lord, have mercy.

That by His gracious example of humility unto death we learn humility of faith, repent of our sin and unrighteousness, and learn to delight in His will and walk in His ways all the days of our lives, let us pray to the Lord.

C Lord, have mercy.

[&]quot;Hosanna!" we, too, cry unto Him. We, too, need our Savior's grace!

[&]quot;Hosanna to our Redeemer King who willingly took our place!"

[&]quot;Hosanna!" we supplications sing, in faith our palm branches raise Till "Hallelujah!" becomes our song, our heav'nly, eternal praise!

That the Lord receive the offerings we bring, with the sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, as testament of our faith and as sign of our gratitude, let us pray to the Lord.

C Lord, have mercy.

That the Lord bless His Church, those who minister in His name, and all the baptized people of God in their vocations of worship, witness, intercession, and service, let us pray to the Lord.

C Lord, have mercy.

That God visit His grace to us and to all nations, that we may have good leaders and that we may be good citizens, until the day we join the saints before the Lord in His eternal city, where He has prepared for us an everlasting place, let us pray to the Lord.

C Lord, have mercy.

Into Your hands, O Lord, we commend ourselves and all for whom we pray, trusting in Your mercy, through Your Son, Jesus, Who also taught us to pray:



This service is an ancient form of worship dating from the fourth century. The tone is very somber as candles are extinguished, and the sanctuary is gradually darkened to remind worshipers of the three hours of darkness which blanketed the earth during Christ's crucifixion as He suffered the punishment of being forsaken by God for our sins. The darkness of Good Friday prepares us for the brilliant dawning of Easter. The Good Friday tenebrae begins at 8:00 p.m.
